B. Review Priority Issue and Activity lists - Develop 2018 Action priorities

No new adjustments to the 2018 Priorities at this meeting.

III. Water Supply

- A. Augmentation Project
 - AESI Report Chuck provided a final report for the Augmentation project. He noted there were some loose ends that did not get accomplished but that overall, the project was a success.
 - Publicizing results Symposiums, websites The Capital Press plans a feature story on the project. It will be featured at the Water Supply Symposium on December 13th as well.
- B. Water Supply Work Group report
 - Renewed push for drainage by drainage negotiations leading to binding agreements
 - Support from State via \$450k budget request
 - Supported by the Planning Unit
 - Support via Dec. 13th Water Supply symposium

The Board reviewed the background and direction of the AWB's next step proposal. This is being discussed at all the WIDs this month in preparation for the December 20th AWB meeting. There was support for the AWB leading with a proposal to the other water users but details still need to be addressed. The risk of pushing this drainage based implementation plan was weighed against no action and hoping that enforcement would never occur. The Board suggested a wider discussion of farmers lead by the AWB water supply committee in December.

IV. Water Quality

A. Monitoring Results – Fred reported good news on the latest testing. There was one higher count in Portage Bay during the high rains. The data indicates that the bay could be opened but the subjective concern over "do the conditions that caused the closure still exist" standard is yet to be reached.

- B. ZAP unit locations, installation, O & M, reporting –the unit on Bertrand has not been installed yet.
- C. South Lynden source tracking project this DNA project is progressing slowly. The recent EPA/Lummi DNA study in Portage Bay initial data indicates that 83% of the fecal was non-traceable. No bovine showed up. The inconsistency of not reporting this data has been discussed.

V. Drainage/Habitat

- A. Flood Meeting Fred attended a Flood meeting where Ned Currence presented a lot of fish data. It looks grim for the future of the wild fish stocks. Fred suggested a dialogue with the fish managers and the WIDs to better understand each other's concerns.
- B. Ditch maintenance Fred noted that some landowners were pressing for a spray program on the West Double Ditch.
- C. Stormwater in Duffner Dale noted he had mentioned the Duffner concerns to Steve Banham. The BWID needs to send a letter to the City on behalf of the DID to request payment for a portion of the management costs of maintaining Duffner Ditch.
